## Mentorship pays off - Kolouseks selected as South <br> Dakota Commercial Hereford Breeder of the Year

Mentorship means a lot to Dick and Scott Kolousek, Wessington Springs, SD. The father and son team from central South Dakota have found great value in working with cattle producers who are willing to mentor them as they develop their cowherd and breeding program. "When we find someone who is willing to work with us, someone we can trust and can learn from, we tend to stay with that program for a number of years," says Dick Kolousek.
Prior to utilizing Hereford bulls on their Angus cowherd, Dick developed a solid relationship with a South Dakota Angus breeder who assisted him in building a functional Angus cow-herd and a selection of Angus bulls from that same program. For years, the program worked very well and the Kolousek family basically had a closed Angus herd until 2005. However, the breeder who was their continual source of Angus genetics decided to retire.

Letter to the Editors..
Editor Byron's Note: I received the most interesting story in a six page handwritten form, from Rex Siebert of Marion, KS who now operates his Hereford operation as the Diamond X Ranch. His letter is in response to my
editorial in Hereford America in the September 2013 issue. As a prelude to the story I would like to mention that Rex worked at the CK Ranch, heading up their registered Hereford for nearly $41 / 2$ years working for the Vanier family. Rex said he loved his time and job with CK and felt like he did a good job

for them, they (CK) were a big part of his Hereford education.

I would also like to point out that Eldon King, who Rex mentions in his letter, worked for us for 25 years coming as a young boy from North Dakota. I would also like to mention that I helped trim bull's feet using Rex's trimming table. This is Rex's letter to me.

Dear Byron,
Your editorial of September 2013 was a most interesting part of past bygone days.

I cannot, and I'm sure that most of your readers, cannot comprehend putting 20 teams of horses into a hay field.

I'm sure that the mowing machines of that day cut a 5 foot swath and the brand of make of the mowers that we used was some kind of "Iland," can't come up with the brand name for sure. (I think these were McCormick-Deerings - BB)
My age coming up the 29th of this month (when letter was written) will be 90, but my memories of those days are very vivid. I remember of always putting 2 mowers in the hay field. My age being about 6 or 7 when I was first sent to the field with a team of black mares hitched to a dump rake, of course flies were our biggest problem. In those days, every harness had a set of fly nets on them, that helped but the mares were still stomping at the flies under their bellies.
Now my rake had a 1" X 10 " board nailed on the rake tongue and one of the mares happened to get her hoof on top of the 10 inch wide spot on the tongue and it broke down, that scared the team and I had a runaway on my hands. Now I'm sure you can remember the seats on a dump rake, and me being of that age, my legs were barely long enough to push the trip down to make the rake dump the hay, so trying to be able to stop a runaway by pulling on the leather lines was impossible and I could see that broken stub tongue jabbing into the ground, I knew what was about to happen, I jumped off the back of the rake, I hadn't any more than landed on the ground and I saw the rake flip forward.
Some way the team came loose from that rake and headed for a four barbed wire fence into our pasture that was the home for the work horses and the mules after their workday was over, they had hit that wire fence abreast breaking the three top wires. Going after the team, they were standing still at the other side of the pasture about a half mile from where they had hit the fence, and to our surprise only one mare had one small cut on her breast.

ons with his mother, wife, 4 girls and 2 boys. My granddad was 6 years old. It was a 1,000 mile trip, why didn't he come by train? I think it was because it would have cost some money. Covered wagons were the cheapest way.

After selling out in Ontario, as near as I can tell, he would have had about $\$ 12,0000$. Now that was a lot of cash back in those days and upon arriving
near the little town or burg of Canada, KS, Crist purchased a half section of bottom land on the North Cottonwood River. It is now the dam area of the Marion Reservoir, but the half section about a mile south on the South Cottonwood River, which is now the Diamond X Ranch that I am so proud of. We have added about 800 acres of bluestem

All of the work I have done with horses and mules, that was the only runaway I ever had. My favorite line to older friends was, "I was 21 years old before I knew that the sun didn't always come up between a mule's ears."

Now back to Eldon King, I cannot remember where I first met him. I was called to do some hoof trimming at the ABC, Kilgore, NE. That was shortly after Eldon had left. The boy in charge of the show cattle told me a little about Eldon. The most important thing I remembered was about his dog. They said that dog was as close to being human as could be. The cattle were kept individually in the small outside pens, Eldon would tell the dog to go fetch an animal in a certain pen and that dog never made a mistake.
I don't know how Eldon found out about me and my Spring-O-Matic table, but he ordered one and I shipped it to him when he had retired, I think it was to Washington State. I received a letter from him one time after he had started his custom hoof trimming, it was a cordial letter telling me that he was enjoying his retirement with the Spring-O-Matic table. I just had received a call from my oldest son, Ladd, he is a graduate from KSU Vet School. Ladd worked his way through vet school with one of my SOM tables and a few of my accounts in the Manhattan, KS, area, along with my account at the KABSV. At that time they had at least 30 to 40 bulls and a lot of dairy sires, with Ladd doing the hoof trimming at KABSV they put him to work on any extra time he could spare along with his school work. Ladd lives at Eureka, SD, and one of his accounts is Bakers. He was telling me about that terrible storm. Bakers were lucky as they had the calves weaned at headquarters, but they did lose about 20 cows. Ladd went up and did the hoof trimming for their (Angus) cow sale.
Now here is a 2 week interval. I had a gall bladder explosion, they pumped air into my chest and made 4 small incisions and went in a picked all the pieces out, it took the doctor over an hour to get it all cleaned up. The doctor said he would have been happy if they would bring him a live one to work on. But Dr. Cranston did a wonderful job, and 2 weeks later I'm back in my office finishing my letter to you.

I love your Hereford paper as I am retired and have leased all my grass and facilities, sold my entire life work about 100 head of registered Hereford females to a great young family the

## John M. Kelsch

John M. Kelsch, 95, died Nov. 27, 2013, at Rancho Mirage, CA. John was born Dec. 1, 1917, in Napoleon, ND.
He was preceded in death by his parents, Andreas and Elizabeth Kelsch, who came to America from the Crimean Peninsula on the Black Sea and from Odessa, Russia in 1898, where their German ancestors had farmed the land since 1805. His three brothers and two sisters also preceded him in death. John's wife of nearly 50 years, Katherine, died in 2001.

Mr. Kelsch is survived by two sons, John A. Kelsch, Grand Rapids, MN, and James D. Kelsch, Rancho Mirage; two grandchildren at Grand Rapids, Jonas T. Kelsch currently living in Zhuhai, China and Celeste K. Kelsch currently living in Madiun on the island of Java in Indonesia; along with many nieces and nephews.

John fought the height of the Great Depression. He jumped freight trains from North Dakota to California at age 16 in 1933. While working in Santa Monica, he graduated from Whittier High School in 1935 and then returned to North Dakota.
He co-owned and managed the Sunshine Ranch, 5,457 contiguous acres 40 miles east of Bismarck at Steele with his father from 1935 until 1969. John's sister, Margaret, and brother-in-law, Alton Edwards, managed the day-to-day operations. The ranch produced some of the nation's finest purebred Hereford cattle. In 1946, investors purchased "Real Silver Domino," a famed bull for the highest sum ever paid at the time for an animal of any breed in North Dakota.
Mr. Kelsch became one of the early pioneers in the North Dakota oil industry with his partner, Charles Donlin, soon after oil was discovered at Tioga in 1951. Together, they formed Keldon Oil Company which was traded on the NASDAQ Stock Exchange.
John was a VIP guest at President Eisenhower's first inauguration in January 1953, where he met and had a meaningful conversation with newly elected Sen. John F. Kennedy from Massachusetts.

(grandson of James J. Hill, founder of the Great Northern Railway), Mr. Kelsch and Joseph Bachmeier saved an 1,800 pound horse named "Buster" from drowning, after the animal became mired in the cold water of the Mouse River. John and his friends were awarded special citations from the American Humane Association.
Mr. Kelsch donated the land and a monument for a cemetery to St. Francis Catholic Church at Steele. He supervised work on the grounds during 1960, and dedicated the cemetery in memory of his parents.
He always enjoyed life today; never waiting for tomorrow, and traveled the world with his wife, Katherine and children - taking many trips to Europe, Russia, the Far East, South America, Mexico, Alaska and Hawaii.

## Roland C. Odland

Roland C. Odland, 89, of Redfield, SD, died Tuesday, November 12, 2013 at the Easter Star Home in Redfield, surrounded by his family.
Roland, or Rollie, as he was most commonly known to everyone, was born May 1, 1924 in Kidder, SD to Ole and Clara (Eggen) Odland. He graduated from Kidder High School in 1942 and immediately went to work at Thorp Farms. While working at Thorp farms, he met and married Marilyn Hanson on December 27, 1948 in Britton. They were married for 46 years before she passed away on June 22, 1995. He worked as the right hand man to Walter Thorp, at Thorp Hereford Farms near Britton, SD from the time he graduated high school until 1949. While he was working on the Thorp Farm, he traveled extensively with Mr. Thorp to stock shows in Denver, Cheyenne, Omaha, Fort Worth, and Milwaukee ending that circuit with the South Dakota State Fair
in Huron. Some of his proudest moments during this time were showing and winning national championship heifers and bulls. These accomplishments include: a 1947 Denver Championship; a 1947 Grand Champion in Fort Worth, TX; a championship Hereford bull of the 1948 show at Fort Worth. While he was working with Thorp Hereford Ranch in 1949, Mr. Thorp, with Rollie by his side was the 1949 big winner in the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in three different classes including one champion Hereford of the show. After leaving Thorp Farm, he worked at Grass Lake Ranch west of Mansfield, SD from 1950-1954. He also farmed at the Fish Farm at Ashton, SD from 1954-1957.
It was in 1957 that Roland and his wife bought and moved their family to the McCone farm south of Redfield. It was here that he raised, bred, and sold his own Registered Polled Hereford cattle until his retirement at the age of 62 . From his own herd, he produced champion bulls, heifers, steers at South Dakota, Iowa, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota and Minnesota State Fairs, and at Here-

## ford shows in Chicago, Denver, Fort

 Worth, Kansas City, Rapid City shows. He had a Grand Champion Polled Hereford Steer over all breeds at Kansas City, Denver and Fort Worth and many state fairs. The largest show string that he had was 26 and the smallest was 8 .He was very instrumental, both as a father and 4-H Leader, in teaching and assisting his children with their many showings and State Fair Championships for Steers, Heifers, and Sheep. As a 4 -H leader, he mentored many other children. His sons, Lee and Tim farmed with him for many years. After his retirement from farming, he began work in the gravel business. After working there for many years, he was proud that his grandson, Clayton Odland took over the gravel business in 2004.
While he was farming, Rollie was a very active participant and member of the National Farmers Organization (NFO) and $4-\mathrm{H}$. He received the Outstanding Leadership Award in 4-H Club Work in 1961 from the South Dakota State Col-

## MHA Feeder Calf Sale Another Success

For the second time since its inception five years ago, the Montana Hereford Association Hereford Influenced Feeder Calf Sale grossed over one million dollars.

1,080 head of white faced calves sold Wednesday, November 13 at the 2013 MHA Sale, held at the Headwaters Livestock Auction Yard in Three Forks, MT. The sale is coordinated by a committee of the Montana Hereford Association.

Eleven buyers participated in the action; spending $\$ 1,021,018$ on white faced calves that day. Prices were up \$15-\$35/cwt over last year's sale.

The MHA Sale is held in the morning, with Headwaters’ special feeder calf sale held in the afternoon. Having the non-Hereford feeder calf sale held the same day gives the MHA sale access to good pricing comparisons for non white faced calves. The average price paid for the white faced calves exceeded their solid colored counterparts in 4 out of 5 weight breaks for both steers and heifers. Many of the heifers were purchased as replacements by local commercial cattlemen.

A comparison of the MHA sale averages with the USDA compiled Montana average market report for that week, indicates that average prices for calves sold in the Hereford Influenced sale fell within the range of the USDA compiled prices in all weight breaks.

In order to sell through the MHA Hereford Influenced sale, the calves need to be at least 50\% Hereford; the other $50 \%$ being of British breeding (Angus, Hereford, Shorthorn, South Devon), dehorned and steered if applicable. Though not a requirement of the sale, producers are encouraged to Age and Source verify their calves and have them weaned for 45 days with appropriate vaccination and worming protocol.

The Feeder Calf Sale Committee was pleased to have Trey Befort, Supply Chain Manager for Certified Hereford Beef, and Dale Venhuizen, AHA and CHB Board Member Committee in attendance at the sale. Trey also gave an update on the CHB program at the reception the night before, with Dale sharing some comments about the program.

Gale Henry of Harrison, NE, can't point to just the disposition, or aggressive breeding behavior, or the feed conversion although he mentioned all of those. For him it's not solely the way that his fed-out Herefords help sell the rest of his cattle in the sale ring. Nor is it how his Hereford bulls keep on working every day, year after year with the dependability and ease of care that he wishes all of his cattle had.
So what is Henry's bottom line for continuing to use Hereford genetics? "I'm fond of Hereford cattle," he stated. "They won't gore you in the ground. They feed good for me." He added that when he mixes them in with his black and black baldy cattle they help sell those cattle, as well. And a major plus is that the packer has always been quite interested in his Herefords.

## 127 Years and Counting

The Nebraska rancher comes by his Hereford partiality honestly. It's his ranching background, a Jaycees competition during his formative years, and a life-long love of Herefords that has shaped his life. Gale and Renee Henry and their son Jay operate on 10,000 deeded acres and 5,000 government permit acres in northwest Nebraska and southwest South Dakota. Daughter Jana lives at Crawford and runs some of the family cattle there, also. Their ranching beginnings were modest.
Gale Henry's grandfather came to Sioux County in 1886 from Columbus, NE. "I've always had some straight Hereford cows," Henry said. He started with two or three cows as a youngster. While in school, Henry's father leased out the family's ranch holdings, but once Gale graduated from the University of Wyoming, he took back one of the ranches and moved to


Gale Henry and his favorite bull, plus some of his Hereford cows. The Henry ranch started in 1886.

Harrison with Renee, his wife of two years.
"I went two years to Chadron and transferred to the University of Wyoming," Henry stated. While he student taught Vocational Agriculture for nine weeks in Newcastle, WY, he chose ranching over teaching for his life's work. He bought odd calves and put together a herd. When there's rain and thus grass he runs at least 400 cows and 400 straight Rambouillet ewes that produce a wool grade of 64 .

Henry took part in the Jaycees Outstanding Farmer Rancher competition, winning the local and Nebraska contests in 1968. He went on to compete on a national level in Des Moines, IA. His appreciation for those experiences runs deep.

He belongs to two grazing associations: the Sugarloaf Grazing District in

Nebraska and the Indian Creek Association in South Dakota. "I have three government permits," he explained, "with 65 in Nebraska where I keep the Herefords, and 65 and 125 permits in South Dakota." With cattle at different pasture sites and a carrying capacity of 30 acres per cow, his family needs to be on their toes when it comes to managing their operation.

## Loves Dispositions,

## Aggressive Breeders

"I'm tired of the bulls that fight or are broke down or crawl over into the neighbors," he said, and thus pointed to the great disposition and breeding reputation of Herefords. "I love a Hereford bull on our black cows." Henry said he has three or four different bunches of cows each summer. He runs one Here-

ford bull with three black bulls, and finds that his Hereford bulls will stay at the water tank and breed cows. He also likes a good black baldy and "the way to do that is to have a good Hereford bull on black cows." For years Henry used Roy Cranston bulls from South Dakota. Cranston had his last sale this spring, retiring after years in the purebred business. "He was a very good man to do business with," Henry said.

Besides the challenge of running cattle in different locations and dealing with government leases, Henry said he is strictly on pipelines. "Nine of us have three wells northwest of Harrison. In South Dakota about five of us went ahead and drilled a 2400 foot deep water well." The latter uses a 30 horse pump. He uses gravity to bring this water to most of his pastures through 2-7/8 inch pipe.

## Drought Forces Choices

Permits. Check. Piped in water. Check. Drought. Ah yes, drought. As if ranching hasn't provided enough challenges over the years, drought has been one more feisty companion to ranchers again this year. Thanks to the tremendous lack of rainfall, Henry has had his permits decreased by 50 head and has pared back his cow numbers on his deeded land. But not his Hereford cow numbers. Northwest Nebraska has faced down drought before. Lengthy droughts. And Henry has stayed with his straight Hereford herd throughout.
"If we sell down some more" due to drought, he said with determination in his voice, "if we've got to sell down, I'll sell the black cows. I'm pretty partial to the Herefords. The dispositions are gentle and good to get around."
"I'll keep my Herefords," he said again. "They've always been good for me."

This left Dick and Scott with the challenge of finding another mentor and source of Angus genetics or utilize this opportunity to think about making a change in their operation.

## Crossbreeding with Herefords

The decision was made to aim for heterosis which comes along with crossbreeding and seek out Hereford genetics to use on the black cowherd. "We were confident we had built up a quality cowherd and with crossbreeding we were really looking forward to producing baldy feeder calves, as they were gaining traction in the industry," Dick says. When we do need to replace Angus females we contact a relative of the initial family we worked with because he has some similar bloodlines, or we seek out other top quality Angus bred females/cows selling in groups. In fact, the Kolouseks recently had the opportunity to rent more pastureland near their headquarters, so they added
could purchase all the bulls from one operation and breeding program was appealing to them.

So Dick and Scott traveled 150 miles north and visited with Jerry Rausch about the Hereford breed and the Rausch program. Scott and Dick were interested in learning more about the EPDs, indexes and other performance parameters they would use to evaluate Herefords in order to select what would best fit their herd. "I showed them the bulls and we talked through the data, especially an index unique to the Herefords called the BMI Index, (Baldy Maternal Index)" says Jerry Rausch. "I also encouraged them to could consider low birth weight bulls on their heifers and not worry about calving challenges." Rausches sell about 30 bulls each February targeted to heifers.

The Kolouseks decided to buy four heifer bulls and they were so pleased with the results that they came back and bought five bulls at our next sale," Jerry says. They purchase bulls out of the top $25 \%$ of our program and utilize the BMI, CHB and CEZ indexes in their evaluation, Jerry explained. From

another 150 Angus cows to their main herd all purchased from one breeder.
Now the challenge was to find a Hereford program to fit their needs. "We started asking folks we knew to recommend some Hereford breeders to us," Scott says Several names surfaced and one that seemed to be a good initial fit was Rausch Herefords at Hoven, SD. The Rausch family annually sells about 125 bulls in February. With the 700 head Kolousek cowherd, locating a ranch selling enough bulls where they
that point on a mentorship began between the Kolousek's and the Rausch family. Currently, 24 Rausch bulls are on hand at the Kolousek Farms with Dick and Scott buying about five or six bulls a year.
"We are glad we took the step to try crossbreeding," Dick says. "The calves are demonstrating more weight and we are pleased with their quality." Scott mentions the Hereford disposition was noticed right away. The bulls were easier to handle and the baldy

calves, once weaned and put on feed, in a short period of time he noticed how calm and easy they were to work with. However, it's difficult for them to compare directly the calf weaning weight from their straight-Angus offspring with their baldy calves, because they made the decision to calve a month later than previously. "We decided it was time to quit fighting cold winter days in calving so in 2008 we pushed our heifer calving back to March 20 and our cows start around April 21," Dick says. This allows them to calve on pasture, reducing scours and with the size of their cowherd they don't have the barn space to calve in the cold weather.

## Baldy calves building reputation

As the years passed, Dick and Scott make their annual trip to Rausch Herefords and continue to work with this successful Hereford family to identify bulls fit for their commercial program. "What's nice is the Rausches, understand our cowherd, they visit us often and they know which bulls to suggest for our program." Dick says. The end result is quality baldy steers and heifer calves that have been very rewarding for the Kolousek's. The family weans in early November and separate off the steer and heifer calves. Both are
put on different feed rations. The steers are the primary focus for the backgrounding, aiming to sell them in mid-to-end of February at the Chamberlain Livestock Auction, located 60 miles southwest of the family farm. "We have noticed people in the area have started to set the selling of their calves to fit the
time we sell ours, because our baldy calves have built a reputation and draw a number of buyers to the sale barn that day," confirms Dick. Today's prices are different than just a year ago, but on January 26, 2013, the family sold 302 baldy steers weighing 637 lbs for $\$ 166.71$, topping the market that day. The newest goal for the Kolousek family is to be able sell a quality set of baldy heifers private treaty annually. "We are aiming to be a reputation herd for baldy heifers," Scott says.

## Dedicated family

Kolousek Farms celebrated 100 years in agriculture in 2005, established by Dick's great-grandfather. Scott is now the fifth generation on the farm living on the main farm. Dick remembers his dad had Herefords in the 1950s from the Bones of South Dakota and the Flattens of Minnesota. In the 1970s Dick and his brother Raymond, worked alongside their dad with the cattle and farming. Dick's brother Raymond passed away in 2002 from cancer. Dick and his wife Janet also have two daughters, Laura and Leah. Scott and his wife Amber, have four children, Isaac 12, Jacob 10, Abby 7 and Ella 4. When time allows Scott does custom hay moving for many neighbors, after putting up 3,980 bales of hay in the summer of 2013 for their own farm. The Kolousek's have done an exceptional job focusing on building a rotational grazing system into their operation. All pastures are fenced, have water access and each pasture gets a one year break from grazing to refurbish for the next year. Cows graze for two weeks in the rotational system before the pasture is moved into a holding pattern. The family also raises corn, winter wheat, and oats.
"We were very surprised to receive the South Dakota Hereford Commercial Breeder of the Year and very humbled and appreciative that someone nominated us for this award," Dick stated. But as you can see from their program, SDHA selected the right awardee in 2013.

## Simple Genetics, Practical Beef Management Key to Seedstock Production

Editor's Note: The following is a speech delivered by KHA Secretary, Tom Granzow from Herington, KS, to a group of breeders at the Black Hereford convention this fall. We felt it was both entertaining and informative for all cattlemen regardless of what breed you raise.

It is indeed an honor and a pleasure to be here. Thank you for asking me to present a simple genetic plan. You definitely have selected a simple person to do that! I have known Dr. Ludwig (CEO of the Black Hereford Assn. and former AHA Director of TPR) for a long time
and I guess he is getting even finally for all those questions I asked him over the years.
As for me, I grew up on a Flint Hills cattle and farming operation in Kansas and still live in that area. Currently, I am the Secretary/Manager of the Kansas Hereford Association and my son and I have about 70 registered Hereford cows. I have a degree in Animal Science from KSU with a few hours toward my masters. I decided to not finish my masters as I did not particularly like academia and was more interested in raising a
family on a ranch and pursuing the production field. I have worked in all facets of the beef business, from cow/calf to custom feeding to meat processing and retail and currently in marketing and promotion. My passion is in the cow/calf and the genetics and improvement of the Hereford breed specifically and the beef animal as a whole.

I think for most of us that are not driven by the technologies that are prevalent in today's genetic business, a history lesson is warranted. I think that when Noah came off of the ark with two beef, he

really didn't know if they were Angus, Hereford, Simmental, Brahma, or any of the myriad of breeds we now propagate. After all, he only had two, and I am sure the farmer in him was only looking for a patch of dry ground and the cowboy in him was checking for grass.

Another thing the Hebrews gave us was the very first judge. When ol' Tom took in his best for the sacrifice and ol' Joe had one too, the man at the temple probably said, "Tom, yours ain’t quite tall enough or thick enough, so I guess you will have to go on back home and do some improving here and there and then come on back!" Things never have really been the same.

Fast forward several millennia to jolly ol’ England. A group of farmers are drinking coffee and seriously discussing how to make more money with the mongrel cattle that they are running in the hills and paddocks of Herefordshire, Angusshire, and Shorthornshire. About the same time, in Europe, farmers were developing the Continental breeds to fit the environment and work load they had, which included draft animals, dairy, and meat production.

These breeds were all started from very diverse gene pools, but with the common goal of quality improvement and planned matings. Over time and with great diligence these mongrels became what we now know as the "modern beef breeds." The environment and location of the work had a great deal to do with how the cattle turned out, but for the most part, they were functional and did what the breeders of the time wanted them to do. Unbeknownst to everyone involved, linebreeding now became the norm as the genetic material was less random and more directionally focused. Each breed that was developed now became responsible for its own genetic makeup and the consequences thereof. Linebreeding is the tool used to not only secure and verify breed improvement, but also to find and isolate breed genetic problems.

Along with this upsurge in cattle breeding and management came the analysis, and from that came the experts of the day that studied the results, compared the results from many environments, and commented on what direction these breeds should take along with trying to mold and fit them to every place and time. One of the greats in this field was Jan Bonsma, a South

winds with the cold made it a very violent storm. Some good Hereford cows of Howard Moss's were pasturing in our hay field and the only available water was from two ditches, both of them being fed from springs on various parts of our ranch. Each day as this weather hit it made it a little more difficult for my helpers and me to chop through the ice to water the cattle. On the 10th day of this storm, we had to call Howard and tell him that we could no longer get water for the cattle and he needed to come and move them home to his place. On the next day with the wind chill factor of about 30 degrees below zero, Howard who usually comes with his trusty horse, was mounted on his 4-wheeler, with his face covered up until he was unrecognizable.
Neighbor, Lony Shaw, and I helped corral the cattle and after a considerable wait for the trucker, the cattle were moved back to Howard's ranch, north of Whitehall, MT. We also had a pen of bulls that had been sold and were awaiting delivery, they were in a pen that is usually watered by a spring. Each day when my faithful helper, Lynn and I, went out to chop the ice, we found it became more difficult by the day. Finally, after about the 10th day of the frigid arctic weather, when I was alone, I found the water was no longer choppable and it was frozen the bottom of the stream bed. We had no other choice, but to water the bulls with a multitude of 5 gallon buckets from water drawn inside of our house.

I finally decided that the bulls needed to go to their new home and I called the purchaser on his cell phone and I told him my problem and he said, "I cannot help you right now because I am in Las Vegas at the National Finals Rodeo, but I will try to get some of my crew to your place to haul the bulls."
The next day the bulls were gone and I'm not sure where they went, but I sure hope it was the crew from the man who bought the bulls taking them to their new home.
Finally, the weather broke and last night it warmed up to zero degrees, which felt like a heat wave after two weeks of brutal cold. To make matters worse, our small town of Twin Bridges and the area to the south of here, had an electric power failure one of the nights that it was so bitterly cold. The electric company was unable to get the problem fixed for 5 hours. In that time, numerous houses were frozen up and the feedlot where our cattle are fed, was subject to freezing in all of the cattle waterers. As I write this story today, it has started to warm up and things are starting to return to normal winter activities.

In my lifetime, I can only remember 3 different times when these kind of cold spells hit us. Once when I was a little boy, the weather had changed
from shirt sleeve weather at noon, to 35 below zero at suppertime with a howling wind. In those days we did not have a highway by our ranch, but had a dirt road that went right in front of our house and barns. There were about four springs that ran under this road and as it got colder these springs froze over and started to form ice over the road. As the night went on more and more people became stranded on the road and could see the lights of our house and headed for shelter of our home.

In those days we had no electricity and no running water, just coal oil lights and a hand pump in the kitchen for water. The outhouse was located about 30 yards from the house and so was not too convenient and trips to it were very quick! As night arrived more and more people were stranded on the road and sought refuge in our house.
By morning we had 18 people in our house and it was a real effort for my dad to find enough coal and wood to keep the house warm that night. My mother did the best she could to furnish food for that many unexpected guests. At that time the telephone lines were above ground and even the Telephone Man had to come into our house for refuge. We had an older shed attached to the house that my mother kept extra food in and we got so low on firewood that night that the men started to tear the shed apart for firewood to keep everybody somewhat warm.

We ended up burning the grates out of the stove that night. That same night a Western Airlines airliner was headed from Salt Lake to Spokane and the weather was so violent that he drifted way off of his course and happened to be over Twin Bridges when they started icing up, somehow as their fuel was di-
minishing, they saw the lights of Twin Bridges showing through a hole in the cloud and made a very rough landing in a hay field near town. They were very fortunate that nobody was killed, but the crew of the airplane was very, very cold when they were rescued by some of the local townspeople. It was fortunate that after this huge blizzard, even though the roads were all drifted shut with $15-20$ foot drifts, the next day, even at 30 below zero, was a bright sunny day, and the people were able to be evacuated to their homes and other shelters. That was a night that will live in my memory for the rest of my life.
As best I can remember there were no fatalities with our Hereford cattle during that storm.

The next particular era I really remember was in the 1970s in which we had a 6 week period in which we encountered 35 to 40 degree below zero weather, in this case it was not the blizzard problem, but extremely cold weather with bright sunny days. In those days we had no cabs on the tractors and feeding the cows was a real ordeal in that it was so cold you could only be out feeding for just a short while and then we had a small pickup truck that we took along so the we could warm up and then go back to feeding the cows.
It became increasingly harder to start the vehicles as that type of weather progressed. This was before the days of heated buildings for tractors, and engine heaters that we enjoy today. We were fortunate to have had a hot spring where the cows were located and the water would never freeze in the middle of the spring, so we could chop the ice away at the edge of the water and the cattle could drink. Our herdsman at the
time was a man by the name of John Mathieson, who said to me after the weather broke that he "would never go through this again as we had in the last six weeks," and I said to him, "I don't blame you." John did however work for us for 24 years!
I have talked to people around the state of Montana, Tennessee, Texas and Mississippi during this cold spell and everyone has had their problems and those of us who have lived in winter country all of our lives have come to expect that in each of our winters we will probably run into some unenjoyable climatic situations.
Our Herefords can take a lot of abuse from the weather and handle it extremely well. I remember many years ago when Bob Schnell, one of the great auctioneers in America at that time, speaking to the crowd at the Missoula Top Cut Sale, said in a recent storm in the Dakotas, that Herefords were less that $20 \%$ of the cattle fatalities, with Angus having nearly 80\%. Herefords are more resilient! If you don't think the Montana winters can get vicious I refer you to the painting done by Charie Russell in the 1800s named "The Last of the 5000"!
Many of you who read this article are now planning and heading to Denver for the big National Western which has probably become the outstanding Hereford event in the world.

With the cattle prices at the level they are now I would expect all of the beef industry to have a banner year. So long for now.

There has been an overwhelming outpouring from around the country to help ranchers affected by winter storm Atlas. Many local businesses, individuals and fellow ranchers have donated time, money and cattle but there were also some generous donations from outside the area. One western South Dakota bank, First Western Bank, raised over half a million dollars to donate to the Ranchers Relief Fund. Dairy Queen donated \$1 per hamburger to the Ranchers Relief Funa and raised over $\$ 40,000$. Sale barns across the state have held roll-over auctions with some of the heifers in those roll-overs being donated by First Western Bank, others from rancher donations.

In early December the Ranchers Re-
lief Fund announced they had raised over $\$ 2$ million. These funds will be distributed sometime in early 2014.
Sylvia Christen, South Dakota Stockgrowers Association Executive says a huge number of individuals have donated to the fund. She adds that many of the donations that came in from local businesses and organizations well exceeded the \$10,000 dollar mark.

Christen says it's humbling to be involved with so much generosity. She adds the goal now is to get ranchers to apply for the funding. She says many may be reluctant to ask for help.
"There are a lot of ranchers out there that say somebody else is worse off, somebody else needs it more than I do. And, while I really appreciate that sentiment, everyone had losses in this storm and that's what this fund is there for and so we really encourage them to apply
and also accept this as a gift from the people who gave it."

There is a process for anyone to nominate a rancher who is in need of help but who won't ask on their own.

Over 4,000 people donated online to the fund. Many seed stock producers are also donating cattle and finances.
Funds will be distributed by the South Dakota Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (SDVOARD) based on criteria established by the founding livestock organizations.
The week before Christmas, Heifers for South Dakota delivered 48 head of bred heifers to several young families hit hard by the early October blizzard. These heifers were donated by a single, anonymous donor who purchased replacement quality females and donated them to the program. Undoubtedly this is a needed shot in the arm for those

who received these heifers. In November another family was the recipient of Heifers for South Dakota's first heifer package. Those were donated by a number of generous cattlemen from Montana and surrounding states. The program continues to receive cattle and is run totally by volunteers.
The number of cattle lost will never be known due to the fact some were never found and are thought to have gone into rivers or lakes, coupled with the fact some ranchers guard their independence and do not want to make a report. If you want to know just how independent western ranchers are, come to western South Dakota! Although the western third of the state covers a lot of miles it feels like a close-knit community. There is no way the majority of these ranch people were or are waiting for FEMA or the federal government to bail them out. Neighbor helps neighbor and some way including a lot of faith, they will all make it through.

The female market in our area has really been hot the last couple of months, especially for Herefords. Of course everyone in this area wondered how the large losses would affect the cattle market. In some ways it may have helped it but the upturn in the market likely has more to do with smaller herd inventory nationwide. We are also seeing a continued trend in favor of the Hereford breed. The survivability of Herefords was demonstrated in spades during the October blizzard. Not to rub salt in the wound, but we saw more Herefords survive the storm than other breeds. It gets people thinking.

Two sizable commercial Hereford herds recently dispersed in our area and the prices were $\$ 2,000-\$ 2,500+$ on these cows. I'm glad these people can reap the benefits of years of hard work and we don't want to forget the importance of commercial Hereford herds across the country. We thank these producers for their contributions to an excellent livestock population in our area and hope wherever the cattle end up, people will continue on with the program.

While a number of states have already had their commercial herds go primarily black, South Dakota and Nebraska and other states still have some very large commercial Hereford herds. If you drive through the countryside and out here in the sticks, you will see them...beautiful, large herds of commercial Herefords.

There are some very successful, very large commercial breeders who retain a straight Hereford program and do very well with them. Although the baldy market is important, let's not forget about the commercial Hereford sector. They make up a very important base for the cattle industry and remain an important customer. I know with the number of black cattle around, it's probably a larger market to hit if you are selling bulls and those baldy females are still incredibly popular as are baldy steers.
We are seeing even more demand for Herefords, females and bulls, as we go into 2014. Here is hoping that continues and you all have a healthy and prosperous New Year!

African animal scientist that many think set the ground work for genetic analysis by phenotype (how an animal looks). In other words, how it looks determines what it will do, or "form follows function". Dr. Bonsma's theories are what I have centered most of my breeding program around and I have a great amount of respect for him and what he did for the beef industry worldwide. He liked an angular female that narrowed at the front end and a male that was deep and thick and triangulated the opposite of the female. A rotating shoulder joint was imperative to him. He learned all of his knowledge from simple observation and confirming his theories with data collection and verified his findings through repeatability. Some of his thoughts were that a cow should look like a milk cow, and if you look at cattle that have been bred for that single trait selection they
do have a different look to them than a breed bred specifically for beef. When I go a little too far with his concepts, my cattle tend to get a little frail and hard doing, which would be expected, yet the basic Bonsma theories do hold true. His publications can still be found on line with some searching, but the books he wrote are hard to find, and sometimes pricey, but well worth the read if you get a chance. He will tell you what to look for in the basic skeletal and phenotypic type and then you will have to modify that somewhat to meet your specific needs, but the basics hold true.
In the mid 1900's, we started collecting all kinds of data, birth, weaning and yearling weights, along with carcass data and began to track just exactly how cattle perform and how they respond to environmental differences, weather and geography, and to management practices, such as confinement and feedstuffs

Ratios were generally used to compare cattle. This was the first great jump in cattle breeding and took the practice from a very local you use my bull and I will use yours, to the actual pursuit of genetics over a large area. The use of artificial insemination also became prevalent and easy at this time. This enhanced the transfer of the genetic material and thus breed improvement worldwide. It made a whole new marketing tool and the consequences of mistakes became greatly enhanced. Lethal and nonlethal genetic material, when not identified quickly, could get spread over great distances in a relatively short amount of time. Breeder integrity and how animals were represented also now became very important. Things like dwarfism in Herefords got completely out of control when single trait selection and an undesirable gene combined to decimate a couple of breeds. Showing of cattle also
became more popular at this time, and we all know how that can influence a breed and the genetics used by breeders. The trouble with ratios was that I really couldn't compare mine to yours unless I once again, knew the actual data and management practices that you use. For example, your weaning weights and mine may be the same, but if you creep feed or I have improved pastures, the data may be skewed somewhat. So, academia and breed registries, along with their performance oriented breeders got involved with making a system that could evaluate breeding programs from afar by assimilating mounds of data on specific traits and, with the aid of massive, state of the art computer programs, assimilating this data and putting it into a format that you and I can understand.
In the Hereford breed, several of the larger breeders from all across the coun-

try were involved and they became the first registry to employ EPDs. At first, this tool was very successful and worked quite well. But, once again, as we all know about computers, garbage in garbage out. Adjustment factors have been introduced to every trait measured, and contemporary group management can greatly skew these numbers and complicate the system. So once again, we are now at the point where only a few can understand the workings of the system and we really need to know how a breeder manages his cattle and how he splits out contemporary groups so we can better manage our genetic decisions. Another factor with EPDs is deciding when enough is enough in the performance categories. Is an 80 EPD for yearling weight about right? Is 120 too much, is 30 on milk about right is 63 too much. So, have we really come full circle, are we not back to where I need to know you specifically and how you do things? Breeder integrity the most important genetic factor and trait I know of is once again at the forefront of my decision making.
In the past few years, genetically speaking, there have been tremendous strides made in the area of DNA testing and isolation of specific traits and the genetic progress this represents. Instead of using phenotype (how an animal looks), we can use genotype (what the genetic makeup is). Experts seem to come up with stunning genetic findings every day, but how will it really affect me as a breeder and my progress in making a better beef animal
fully agree with the mapping of DNA and the genome that has been the result of this research. I applaud the scientists that have used their brilliance and dedication to get this accomplished, but maybe not so much for the beef industry. You see, most animal research was started for the purpose of enhancing the health and wellbeing of humans. DNA mapping can and I believe will help us in the fight against diseases such as cancer and ALS. However, we are a long way from having it benefit the day to day work of the cattle breeder. DNA is simply a map that shows us where the genes involved in traits are located. In other words, Angus and Hereford have the same DNA map. The gene plasma involved between the two breeds varies less than $5 \%$, but that has nothing to do with the DNA map. It is simply the selection pressure we, as humans, have placed on the breeds in our desire to make them what we want them to be.
What the genome does not tell us at this time is what factors influence the genes that we have isolated. As an example, at last count there are several, in the teens, of factors that influence the expression of the gene for marbling. Until further research is done on RNA, the substance that moves proteins around and influences gene expression, the DNA map is exactly that, a map. It only tells s where we are.
So, where does all of this leave us as breeders. I think that we cannot and must not give up the basic, fundamentals of functionality. The cattle we raise must be able to travel well and cover the country. For this they need a
skeleton that is solid and with enough flex to insure ample movement and mobility. The feet and legs must be strong and able to take the punishment of carrying the weight of the animal over the environment they are being raised in. They must have the ability to breed, have a calf naturally, raise that calf to produce beef efficiently and with as little input as is economically feasible, and rebreed and repeat the process over a long period of time Bulls must also be skeletally correct and able to travel. He IS the carrier of the traits that will keep a breed strong and at the forefront of the beef industry. He is $50 \%$ of the genetics you have, but in him will be somewhere near $90 \%$ of your improvement at any one time, so it is important that his genetics be solid, and encompass all that you expect in an animal. Yes, there will be differences in bulls and selection can be different from bull to bull to enhance the herd, but the bull is where compromise should be limited to as little as possible in your genetic quest to get better with each generation.
The fads in this business will try to deter us from getting that optimal animal we desire We will be told that they need to be shorter, longer, framier, or not as framey, double muscled to little muscle and on and on and on. Somewhere in the middle of this is that really good animal that the beef industry wants and will always want. When it comes right down to the nitty gritty, the feedlot and packing industry are the ones that truly decide what we want and need and the technology they have at their disposal is amazing,
with feedstuffs like Optiflex and steroidal implants that whether we like them or not, are here to stay. These compounds can do more in 20 days than you and I can in two generations. This is another reason we need to stick to the knitting of sound functional cattle and not chase fads.
Just as the old adage says, you must be very careful to not put all your eggs in one basket when it comes to single trait selection. For one thing, if the industry shifts away from that particular trait, you will be a long time catching up. More importantly though, single trait selection tends to get you in trouble with other traits and will take you away from raising cattle that are functional and sound in all traits. Selecting too hard for one trait may have a detrimental effect on other traits. As an example, let's say I have a cow that tends to have a higher birth weight in her calves than I may like (we castrate all bull calves that weigh over 90 pounds), but her skeleton is very good, she travels well, is sound in her udder structure, and her calves are always near the top in growth at weaning and yearling. Should I sell her because her male calves are usually too heavy at birth? Should I sell a bull calf out of her that weighs 85 pounds? If she is doing everything else well, it is my job as a breeder to find that mating that works and does contribute all of her good traits to my gene pool through her heifer calf production. It is also my responsibility as a breeder to inform my customers of her negatives as well as all of her posi-

tives and let them decide if that 85 pound bull calf that is an anomaly, is what they want to fit their program. In this example, there are programs out there that do want all of those positives that I mentioned and think that 90 pounds is OK . As long as I explain to them exactly what I have done with my program and where I stand on the trait of birthweight, they may buy that bull with complete confidence in what he will do for them. This applies equally to all genetic traits. There will always be some compromise in your progress toward a well balanced, genetically reliable program. I have yet to see the perfect beef animal, but we are all striving to produce the best we can.
This will also apply specifically to the search for homozygous traits. In the breed I am most familiar with, the polled gene is dominant over the horned trait and since our merger in the 90s has been a topic of great debate. So if I have a heterozygous polled/horned bull, while he may be polled to look at, he will not take horns off of all my customers' cattle. If I go the next step to homozygous polled, yet sacrifice the traits I have long bred for in my predomi nately horned herd for that one trait, I may not be able to replicate the success I have
built up. Therefore, I must be very careful in selection for this trait that I don't compromise my ideals, and that I am forthright in telling my customers my plan. The second polled bull I use is the most important one that I select, since the first selection got a great amount of hybrid vigor when introduced to my linebred horned herd. Your breed experiences this when selecting for the dominant black gene. The red bull that you use on the F1 baldies is vitally important to your future as are the subsequent choices you make. Don't compromise function and basic beef production in the pursuit of the homozygous animal. In time that homozygous trait will come to pass and take care of itself, and you will not have compromised your basic genetic progress and principles.
And when you do come up with that good one that seems to do it all, whether in one trait or several, do one more thing. See if it is repeatable. Do his or her sibs excel, too and can he pass on that trait to the next generation? When you are taking the genetics from two breeds to start another, that first cross should excel and be good in many things, but it is of vital importance that they be able to pass on those highly desirable traits to their offspring to benefit the whole breed. Too many times we have hyped an animal on unproven data
and by the time we see the breeding results, we find that they are not what we thought they would be.
In summation, I urge you that are just getting into this business to go and see as many cattle as you can in the Angus, Hereford, and Black Hereford breed and analyze them for what they are and where they are. Study up and learn all you can about fertility, longevity, structure, and beef production. Fertility and efficiency have always been and will continue to be the traits that most effect profitability in the beef industry. If you desire show cattle or want an emphasis to be on a single trait, do so with an open mind and know that hype and extras won't always be the most functional way to go. Keep that home herd solid by continuing to select for balance in the traits that are important to fertility and functionality. Those cattle may not win every time, and your progress toward that one trait of emphasis may be slowed down some, but, at the shows they will keep you in the hunt and always appeal to someone in the crowd. Your cowherd will remain solid at the core for the important traits and something you can fall back on if and when mis takes are made. Use honest numbers on performance and make sure the breeders you get genetic material from are willing to show you everything and tell you what

they do and how they manage their cattle at the grassroots level and not just in the marketplace. Get to know your genetic suppliers cow herds as well as you can. Know that you are going to make mistakes, but with a solid knowledge of function and a cowherd that is balanced, you will recover from these mistakes and be stronger for it.
As breeders in a relatively new breed, be very conscious of the beef industry, not just your breed. Research it well and strive to produce the best you can that fit the industry while maintaining a breeding herd that is functional and long lasting. Don't let one segment or another drag your whole breed down a road of genetic demise. But most of all, use integrity to guide your every move and be true to one another in all hat you do and understand that it is not a short term thing to be a cattle breeder, but that it should and does take a lifetime to get where you and your breed need to be. I personally believe that I will never achieve all of my goals as a breeder and that my best calf crop is always going to be the next one.
We can look at genomics, EPDs, and any other contrivance possible, but at this point none of those things have come close to replacing a good cowman with a lifeime of focus. On the cow side of the industry, there is a tremendous variation in environmental pressures. The fantasy that a geneticist manipulating one of thousands of genes that has hundreds of interactions will produce the desired results is not the reality I have seen. We all need to see (in person) as many cowherds as possible and spend the effort to sample outside genetics. It still boils down that great cowherds are made by culling the ones that don't fit our environment or vision
In closing, I once had a breeder I have a great amount of respect for tell me, "If everyone would try to raise 100 good ones instead of one that is perfect we would be a lot farther down the road to improvement in this breed of cattle.
