a century ago when I made my last trip on a freight train with show cattle.
I was 19 years old at the time and had just finished my freshman year at the University of Montana where I was enrolled and taking Business Administration. I had lettered as a freshman in both football and track, and was looking forward to the next year of college and competing with the big boys in sports. I also had a special girl in college that I did not want to leave with all those college boys.
I had been home about a month when my dad informed me that he decided that year to show our cattle at the Portland International in Portland, OR, the Montana State Fair at Great Falls, the Midland Empire State Fair in Billings, MT and the Tri-State Futurity in Miles City, MT, which was held in early winter He wanted me to take the show cattle and he said, we will find someone to go with you and help. (A high school boy the first trip, an unreformed drunk the second trip, and a guy that did not want to work the third trip, so I fired him).
My dad also informed me that he thought I should skip college for the fall quarters so that I could help with our annual sale in the fall and then take the cattle to Miles City later in the year. I was quite disappointed because I had high hopes of being able to contribute
to the Grizzly football team that year as a running back. I had been the second leading scorer on my freshman team and so the coaches were very interested that I return in the fall. So was the girlfriend!

However, it is very difficult to turn your father down, so to make long story short, I agreed to road the show herd for about 6 months. The plan called for over 10,000 miles of travel in a box car on the freight train with the cattle and we normally took 10-12 head of cattle on the show circuit. Dad ordered the boxcar from the Northern Pacific (now the Burlington Northern) and the boxcar was moved up to the siding at Twin Bridges, where we installed tie down rings for the cattle, and did the rest of the preparations such as water tank, hay, feed, straw etc. that we would need for the trips.

I will only describe the last of the trips because of the length of this article, however, I will say the first 6,000 miles from home to Portland and return, was accomplished in good order and the summer trip from home to Great Falls, Billings and back home went well. After our fall bull sale, I had to get ready for probably the most difficult trip of all. I will tell you in a later article about our trip to Portland and back and the trips to the state fairs that year.

It was possible in those days to hire a boxcar for a period of time, and my dad did just that, we rented the boxcar for 6 months. After we returned from the Bill-

ings Midland Empire show，the boxcar that we had outfitted，sat on the siding at Twin Bridges for 2 months．After the sale that fall，and the delivery of about 100 bulls to their new homes，we had to start planning for the trip to the Tri－State Futurity in Miles City，MT．The futurity idea was a concept that was fostered by my dad somewhat after the horse futurity principal．The idea was that the cattle would be entered in the futurity show 6 months prior to the show and the cattle that were entered had to be the ones that were brought，shown and sold at this event．There could be no changes or substitutes．If something happened to the cattle they had to be withdrawn．The idea was presented to the major breeders in the states of Montana，North Dakota， Wyoming，South Dakota and Idaho． Breeders from the states of Montana，

North Dakota and Wyoming agreed on the principals and the various locations would be alternated between the 3 states．A few breeders that did not wish to show cattle in those states declined to be part of the organization．The event was called the Tri－State Futurity and claimed wide acclaim for the quality and substance of the cattle and the sales results later proved this to be true．Several beauti－ ful trophies were donated by various hotels，oil companies and other varied agricultural groups．I have never seen any trophies in the cattle busi－ ness that would match these trophies in size and beauty． Before each of them could be permanently claimed they had to be won three differ－ ent times．These trophies

 Heifer and Get of Sire．My dad was very competitive，and it was his desire to win any，or all of these that he could． We finally won both the Champion Bull trophy and the Champion Get of Sire trophy the three times to keep them permanently．In early November we had the cattle ready to travel to Miles City．We were taking two bulls and one heifer，all sired by the same bull．Because we had such a small group of cattle，my dad decided that I could go to the show alone with cattle．The boxcar was still sitting on the track and my dad decided that this was the way to move the cattle to Miles City．After the cattle were sold we would turn the boxcar back to the railroad in Miles City．

I carefully prepared the box car with straw and the hay and grain that I would need to complete the trip．I also had a 55－gallon drum of water that we felt would be adequate for the 400－mile trip， that the railroad estimated would take 16

hours. Because the weather was starting to get cool I planned, and took what I presumed would be adequate winter clothing. I took my sleeping bag to help keep warm and possibly to get some shut eye if possible. I took enough food, and water, for about 3 meals thinking that if we were in Miles city in 16 hours, that would be sufficient. (Little did I know!)
So, our ranch crew helped me load the cattle into the car with my show gear and personal belongings and I waited for the train to pick me up. The railroad had proposed to pick me up at about noon time and I was ready. The small train chugged up the tracks at about two in the afternoon and I was advised that it was necessary for them to go up country about 20 miles and then I would be picked up on the return in about two hours, and then we would head to Whitehall, MT, where the main line of the Northern Pacific ran at that time from Portland to Chicago. After being picked up and going down the Jefferson Valley toward Whitehall, the train chugged along at about 20 miles per hour, because of the varied track conditions in this valley.
By the time we traveled to Whitehall the fall day was getting very short and darkness was approaching. The cattle were doing fine, but it was getting uncomfortable in the car because it was getting cold and of course in the box car after dark, all you had for light was your flashlight. The thing that I never got used to when riding a freight train was how they would "hump" you when they connected the cars. For those of you that are not used to railroad trains, whenever they would connect the cars you would be standing still and they would connect the cars at about 5 miles per hour.
After the many thousands of miles traveling in the boxcar I never got used to this, if you were not ready you would be knocked down and I always hoped that the cattle were laying down so that they would not get knocked down by the "humping."

Once we were on the main line of the Northern Pacific we rolled along at a pretty good pace to Laurel near Billings, MT. Of course, we had to go over the Bozeman Pass and that made very slow travel for about 20 miles. After we did

get over the pass, we went at a very fast clip into Laurel. We got into Laurel late at night and were put on a side track and sat there for several hours. I was getting very nervous because we were way behind schedule and the weather was really starting to turn cold. My drinking water froze and my food was ice cold. In a freight yard, on a freight train, you never dared leave your car because we were not sure when the train might start moving and the "bums" started to look for a ride. No one ever came by that you could talk to about the delay, so there was nothing a person could do but sit and wait it out. Very late at night we got connected and the train started to roll toward the east to Miles City, my destination.

It was getting colder all the time at Laurel and as we passed Billings and out onto the flatlands of Eastern Montana it got extremely cold and I could tell we

were in a major blizzard. I put on all the clothes I had, got into my sleeping bag and moved over between the cattle to get some of their warmth, as it had been a long and stressful day, and I finally went to sleep.

I was awakened the next morning by someone opening the boxcar door. As I looked over the top of one of the bulls, I could see three strange looking men coming into the car in a very inquisitive manner. They didn't say anything until they were almost on me, and my first perception was that I had a real problem here.

As I rose up out of my sleeping bag from among the cattle, these guys started laughing and then it dawned on me that these men were part of the railroad crew and I had arrived in Miles City. The railroad men thought it was really funny that a guy was laying down in a boxcar trying to stay warm in between the cattle.

They then informed me that it was 35 below zero that morning. I was extremely happy to get the cattle into the barn and get regrouped. This, for me, would be the end of approximately 10,000 miles of traveling on a train in the past 6 months. Even though I was just 19 and in excellent physical shape, I was extremely tired and worn out, and in those days when you showed cattle and rode on the train your work days normally were 18 hours a day, as
we were at the fairs and stayed with the cattle.

The music and noise of the carnivals would keep us awake until 2 o'clock in the morning and in those days there were always a few old herdsmen that would wake me at about 4 o'clock in the morning and tell me, "Byron, it's time to get up and go to work."

We did very well at the Tri-State Futurity and we won the third leg of the Get of Sire trophy, which made my dad extremely happy. The sale and show went along very well. My dad had arrived by motor car the day before the show and when the cattle were sold, we loaded the rest of the remaining show tack and headed for home.

I told my Dad on the way home, "After 10,000 miles on a boxcar covering over five states, this is the end of my railroading. From now on we need to go by truck." My dad agreed and said, OK. However, the freight train story was not yet to be ended and in a future article I will tell you the rest of the railroad story. And by the way, I married the girl, and Pauline and I were married for 63 years until she passed away two years ago.

shot in the arm. Auctioneer Joe Goggins from Billings, MT, a familiar face in our area and a premier auctioneer, handled this sale at his normal rapidfire pace. The sale grossed $\$ 1,063,500$, with nine bulls averaging $\$ 63,889$, 22 females averaging $\$ 18,273$, four pregnancies averaged $\$ 9,500$ and one pick-of-the-herd sold for $\$ 10,500$.
Not to be outdone, the other bellwether, VanNewkirk Herefords kicked off the production sale side of the equation with a tremendous offering of more than 200 Hereford bulls and 250 Hereford females to a packed house. Averaging \$6,905 on the yearlings and $\$ 7,337$ on the two-year-olds tells me there is strong demand for good Hereford bulls. What a great way to start off the year!

Congratulations are in order for a friend of ours, Scott Dirk, who is being honored as the Black Hills Stock Show's Agribusinessman of the Year. He is currently the director of field services for Tri-State Livestock News out of Belle Fourche, SD.

I first met Scott about 25 years ago when we were both interviewing for the job of editor of the South Dakota Hereford Times. Our lives went different directions, mine the way of Herefords and his in the way of all-breed publications but I think back on this meeting on occasion. Scott is an excellent fieldman and has done well for himself. His character, determination and talent make him deserving of the
award. Congratulations Scott!

sold her second calf, Aristocrat, the youngest bull to ever hit register merit, to Milky Way Farms for $\$ 35,000$. Zato Heir was also resold to Milky Way Farms for $\$ 50,000$.
As it turns out Haxton's first cow, HH Miss Advance 5139, who is a straight Line One cow was purchased for $\$ 40,000$ from Holden Herefords and resold for $\$ 175,000$. She has produced well over a million dollars in
progeny. She also is the great grandmother of these two bulls, H DeBerard 7454 ET and H Montgomery 7437 ET.

## Daniel Koester

Daniel Malcolm Koester, age 69, passed away on Saturday, December 16, 2017, with his family by his side. Dan, the son of Malcolm and Ruth (Nelsen) Koester, was born on December 13, 1948, in Northfield. He was raised on the family farm near Dennison and graduated from Northfield High School in 1967-just recently attending his 50th class reunion.
Dan was an active member of Rice

County 4-H and the Big Giants Club, receiving Rice County Outstanding Junior Leader and the I Dare You award. A parliamentary tactician, Dan was "Mr. Robert's Rules of Order", and honed his early leadership skills conducting Rice County 4 -H Federation meetings. He was a founding member of the Minnesota Jr. Hereford Association and attended many American Jr. Hereford Association (AJHA) events in Kansas City.
After high school, he attended the University of Minnesota and majored in animal science. He was President of the St. Paul Board of Colleges in 1970-

71, was awarded the A.M. Freeman Student Leadership Medal, and introduced Nobel Laureate Dr. Norman Borlaug at the reception given in his honor. As a member of the College Republicans, he worked on many campaigns. For 17 years, his family was committed to the University of Minnesota Agriculture Foreign Exchange Program, bringing more than 25 students from Europe, New Zealand and South Africa to the farm during the summer months.
While at college, Dan met Karen Wetter who was a Bailey Hall resident advisor. They were married May 19, 1972, and together they returned to
the family farm, GVF Herefords. For many years, Dan worked early mornings at the South St. Paul stockyards as a hog buyer. Dan and Karen enjoyed being together, whether it was showing cattle, being active $4-\mathrm{H}$ adult leaders, drives along the Mississippi, overnights at La Crosse, cutting the annual Christmas tree, collecting Hereford art, or attending national Hereford activities, particularly AJHA Expos.
In 1977, Dan and Karen welcomed their first daughter, Audra. She was a joy to Dan who loved Herefords, too. Barbie joined her big sister in 1980 and would ultimately become Dan's right-hand man. Though Dan respected their femininity, he raised them to do all the things boys were expected to do on the farm. He relished in his promotion of becoming Grandpa to Vivian (5), Dean (4), and Thomas (2). Additionally, he was a board member of the Rice County Agricultural Society and a member of the State 4-H Livestock Project Development Committee. Dan was active in the Dennison Lutheran Church council.
In the past year, he had endured and conquered a number of health issues. On the day of his accident, he was happy and feeling great, compiling an organized itinerary of the cattle work that was to be done the next day.
He is survived by his wife, Karen; daughters Audra Koester (David) Thomas of Fountain Hills, AZ, and Barbara Koester-Amy (Ryan) of Dennison; grandchildren Vivian Koester Thomas, Dean Malcolm Amy, and Thomas William Amy; sister Sharon Wolseth of Aurora, CO; many nieces, nephews, and cousins, as well as other relatives, cattle friends, and neighbors. He was preceded in death by his parents.

## Dobesh Ranch Named SDHA Commercial Breeder of the Year

The Dobesh family has been raising Hereford cattle in the foothills of the Black Hills for generations.
Dane and Kristi Dobesh are currently managing the ranch, with Dane's father Frank still active as well. Dane's mother Marilyn passed away in 2010 from cancer. Her parents, Walt and Della Crago produced registered Hereford bulls in the Belle Fourche, SD area.
Frank's parents, George and Bernice raised and showed registered Hereford bulls near Tilford, SD as partners in the South Dakota Hereford Ranch.
Frank and Marilyn were married in 1962 and began their career by managing various ranches while raising their four children; Misti, Boe, Clint, and Dane. They have made their home in the Belle Fourche River breaks since they purchased the ranch and part of the cow herd from Marilyn's parents in 1978. The rest of the cow herd were Blair Hereford genetics from the ranch

Frank grew up on. One of Frank's dad's main tasks was developing one of the early bull test facilities for Blair's and the surrounding registered bull producers. This experience proved to Frank early on the true value of fast gaining fertile cattle.
These goals have remained a central part of managing the herd to this day. Even though most of the herd started as registered cattle, Frank and Marilyn made the decision to switch from producing bulls to producing commercial bred heifers.

Dane's interests followed ranch life from the start. He spent countless hours working on 4-H project animals as well as learning to be very critical of quality and genetics. His compassion for animals led him to attend SDSU to pursue an animal science/prevet degree. During his 4 years there he was active in Farmhouse fraternity and met Kristi Hoffman. Dane chose to forgo vet school to return home. He took over management of the ranch in 2005 and married Kristi in 2006. They have four children, Kasey, Avery, Kortney and Emery who represent the next generation being raised on the ranch. The kids all love helping feed cows and pitching up hay to calves.
The Dobesh's focus is on producing top quality mother cows. They purchase Hereford and Angus bulls for the cowherd. All the heifer calves are retained and developed for bred heifers. The top Hereford heifers go back into the herd as replacements and the F1 baldies are sold as bred heifers. One tradition the family has carried on is trailing the heifers and cows eight miles to the sale barn instead of hauling.
The steers are marketed in the fall directly off the cows, and most years directly out of the corrals. The majority of the cows are summered in the Black Hills on National Forest Permits, with the remaining cows summering on additional family land in the southeast corner of Montana. The cows are then wintered and calved in the river breaks at home. The entire herd has been managed as drug free as possible for decades. Most animals from the ranch have had no more than two shots in their life, a 7 way at branding and a bangs vaccination.
The success of the Dobesh family has been tied to land and Hereford cattle for generations. Dane and Kristi are proud to raise their children in the traditions of agriculture and Hereford cows will continue to be the foundation that their ranching business is built around.

# Crossbreeding: Manage Heterosis To Increase Output Value 


#### Abstract

\section*{By B. Lynn Gordon}

Making decisions which impact the outcome of your breeding herd is not easy. "The decisions you make in your breeding system today are going to be decisions you have to live with for 10 20 years," Bob Weaber, Kansas State University Beef Cow/Calf Extension specialist, said. As a result, he encourages producers to do their homework before making decisions, be proactive and think through breeding program goals to optimize profitability. Weaber discussed "Managing Heterosis" at an educational forum in August 2017, hosted by Sandhill Farms, Kevin, and Vera Shultz and Family, Haviland, KS. He focused on the development, economics, and outcomes of crossbreeding. "Sometimes producers think crossbreeding, and high-quality, and highvalue end-product are exclusive events, but that is not true," Weaber said. "We can build crossbred animals with value on the cow side, and still produce a product that does well in the feedyard and on the rail."


## Two Steps of Sire Selection

Weaber told producers to begin with a critical eye and thorough analysis of their cow/calf operation to create an informal breeding objective. "When we understand the constraints in production systems, it gives us an idea of what our genetics need and what the confining factors might be," he said. "Focusing selection pressure on the right traits,

at the right time, will make the right difference."

The first step is selecting the right breed to meet herd objectives, and second, is choosing the right individual within that respective breed. For example, using a terminal sire for terminal traits. Tools such as EPDs and selection indexes can drive your program toward genetics to meet program objectives. "Most importantly, this is a two-step process," Weaber said. "If you skip over step 1, then you will invariably make a mistake." Without production system goals one tends to make decisions on the spot not in alignment with the overall direction of their program.

## Why Crossbreed

Why implement a crossbreeding program? Weaber asked this of attendees at the educational program. His answer, to increase profitability and decrease

headaches. What does this mean? Well, research and economic data have demonstrated increased profitability from crossbred cow herds is substantial along with improved performance in cows and calves. However, he does admit a rotational crossbreeding system can offer some constraints for smaller herds under 50 head, but the KSU Extension specialist believes options still exist to optimize heterosis within this constraint.

An important question when developing a crossbreeding system is how to generate replacement heifers? To generate replacement heifers, crossbred cows need to be factored into the program and Weaber suggested this is easiest by purchasing F1 females in breed combinations determined to work toward your program goals.
Secondly, how will you market the offspring? Isolate trait emphasis needed in sire selection to assist in determining the route for calf marketing, for example: which sire(s) is needed for a terminal system, which breed combinations make sense, are there additional ways to capture value. Decisions should be considered against a background of constraints such as labor, facilities, cow inventory, and existing breed composition.
When considering crossbreeding versus a straight bred program, Weber
suggests you evaluate, "Do the benefits of selection for economically important/ convenience traits within the breed (e.g, straight-breeding) outweigh the improvement of lowly heritable traits via heterosis. "You need to be able to answer if your straight bred program is generating enough added value to offset the dollars you trade away in the decision to not crossbreed."

To further understand these tradeoffs, one needs to look at additive and nonadditive genetic merit. Additive genetic merit is the traits a bull transmits, (e.g. EPDS and selection indexes). Nonadditive is heterosis - it is hybrid vigor. Beef production can capitalize on both these classes of genetic merit, heritability and/or heterosis.
Heritability is the amount of variation observed in individual animals due to genetic controls. When developing a crossbreeding system its best to identify traits you can improve on. "Use heritability for highly heritable traits whereas crossbreeding can be used for traits with low heritability," he said.

The power of crossbreeding occurs through heterosis and breed complementarity. Most common is individual heterosis, which occurs when two straightbred parents are crossed and the offspring gains advantage from the cross-mating. The advantage to that in-

dividual (offspring) is called individual heterosis. Another form, maternal heterosis, is the benefit of having a crossbred cow and gaining the performance attributes associated with the maternal abilities of the cow.
"We get heterosis by putting any two breeds together; but sometimes those breed combinations don't make that much sense, so that's when breed complementarity comes into play," Weaber said. Selecting breeds for core traits that work together so the traits will fill one of the breed's shortcomings

is breed complementarity. If you need to add maternal traits to your program, select a breed strong in that area, or if you want to add carcass value, using a sire in your crossbreeding program to upshot carcass genetics.

## Economics of Crossbreeding

In his years working as a geneticist in cow/calf production, Weaber has studied the research and worked with first-hand situations to measure the economics of crossbreeding. "Crossbreeding has proven to make a substantial difference in performance and efficiency." Extensive research conducted

at the Meat Animal Research Center (MARC), Clay Center, Neb., reports crossbred cows with crossbred calves produce about $23 \%$ more calf output than straightbred cows and calves. In this study, breed effect is removed. The cows in the study were in the same environment, with relatively the same inputs and the outcome was $23 \%$ more weaning weight per cow exposed. Thus, profitability dramatically increased. "By increasing revenue and holding cost constant, profit increases primarily due to the impact of heterosis."

Additional research documented crossbred cows live about $11 / 3$ years longer than straightbred cows, reducing

the number of replacement heifers needed to enter back into the herd. Fewer replacements, mean lower cost. Weaber reminded producers, the replacement enterprise is the single biggest cost in cow/calf production. "Changing the cost of replacement rate is a big number, it's a number that will make you think," he said. With the reduction of animals going back into the herd as replacements, more animals are available for marketing, increasing the calf marketing pool by as much as $4-6 \%$. Another positive profit driver for a crossbred operation.

Profitability from crossbreeding
was further documented in a scenario outlined by Weaber. In an economic analysis based on 100 cows, with an $80 \%$ weaning rate, average calf weaning weight of 575 lbs., and over a 10year horizon, he factored in the results found in crossbreeding research. A 6\% improvement in calf survival to weaning from a crossbreeding system (continued on page 40)

(continued from page 39) would result in 48 more calves to market over the 10-year timeframe. The 100head cow herd would also experience an improvement of $4 \%$ on weaning weight from individual heterosis, increasing the total pounds of calf weight available to market, by $18,400 \mathrm{lbs}$. Having crossbred cows adds another $4 \%$ improvement due to maternal heterosis for an overall gain in weaning weight of $8 \%$. With the research indicating an average wean-

ing weight per cow exposed increase of $23 \%$, this factors in an additional 105,800 lbs more to market over the


10 years, which is the equivalent of 18 more, 575 lb calves/year, utilizing an estimated value of $\$ 1.50$ /cwt for a 575 lb calf (market value at time of presentation). Weaber's final calculation found heterosis in this scenario is worth $\$ 150$ / cow/year.
Added value in a crossbred herd can also be in the impact of increased reproduction rate. When the percentage of calf crop weaned is increased, more cows get pregnant resulting in more calves for sale. To emphasize this point, is the example of, a $7 \%$ increase in cow pregnancy from $83 \%$ to $90 \%$ on a herd of 100 cows, is seven more 500 lb ., calves produced and able to market at an estimated $\$ 145 /$ cwt, which increases gross income by $\$ 5,075$. This is the value realized from crossbred cows and is equivalent to increasing revenue by \$61.44/head or decreasing breakeven by $\$ 11.27 / c w t$.
Weaber said. "Producers today face the challenge of fixed resources such as land, however, figuring out a way to increase output, adds to profitability and sustainability of your cow/calf system. The only thing you want to maximize is profit, everything else you want to optimize."

## Breeding System Rotations

There are two primary crossbreeding system rotations. A two-breed rotation and a three-breed rotation. Weaber did indicate 50 head cow herds could utilize a two-breed rotation. For additional information on crossbreeding

To develop a crossbreeding system or fine-tune your current program, Weaber concluded with these final suggestions:
start by building a plan and setting attainable goals and keep the following considerations in mind; what are your marketing end points, how will you develop replacement females, factor in the environment, focus on management capabilities and finally, once you build your plan, stick with it.


## Suggested Mating System Goals

1. Optimize the utilization of calf and maternal heterosis.
2. Utilize breed complementarity to match cows to their environment and their progeny to market targets.
3. Minimize variation in progeny phenotypes by stabilizing breed inputs.

## Greater Omaha Cattle Buyers Want You to be Their "Customer"

In the mix of seasoned cattle buyers that work for Greater Omaha, a few new hires have added to the talent pool. About 10 total individuals are part of the team that travel the "Napa Valley of Beef" and beyond procuring cattle for Greater Omaha. Sorting through yards and evaluating cattle is only a small part of
 the workweek for at least 3 unique buyers for Omaha. With almost 60 years of combined experience between them in the beef business, these three individuals bring unique talents and depth to Greater Omaha's procurement team.
In the beef business, the name "customer" is used traditionally to refer to people who buy boxed beef, steaks, burgers, and roasts. This is common knowledge that all sellers need "customers" in order to sell wares. The uncommonly known aspect of the word "customer" is that the word is also used by Greater Omaha's buyers to refer to the people they buy from. Over the years, they have become specialized cattle buyers focused on building "customers". Each have become specialists and each in their own way has earned the trust and respect of their "customers."

## Meet Pete and His Repeat "Customers"

Years ago, the action of sale barns framed the upbringing of Chris Peterson (known as Pete) as a farm kid from central Iowa.
His father, grandfather, and great grandfather owned sale barns, depending on that as their bread and butter in those days. Pete grew up involved in 4-H and FFA. He led the FFA chapter as president as well as participating in judging livestock.
After graduating from Iowa State University, Pete interviewed with Excel for a job on the production line, but he was persuaded to work in procurement by the head of that division at the time. He spent two years in Plainview, TX, training on the basics of kill floor, fabrication floor, scheduling, and tagging beef. All of those things have stayed with him throughout the years. From there he was given a cattle buying territory in northwest Iowa where he tripled the number of cattle procured in that region for the company.
One of his favorite jobs was buying cattle in Canada. He said it was like a three-year vacation as he could hunt and fish as well as doing the job he loved. In this location, he again tripled the number procured.

After 28 years with Excel, he joined Greater Omaha where he is the head cattle buyer. Pete oversees the buying staff of nine, conducts the weekly cattle buy, and manages his own territory. He has the crème de la crème of territories. Cuming County, NE, has the largest number of feedlots in the United States with a capacity of over 330,000 head. Through the years, he developed relationships with many of the producers in northwest Iowa who send their cattle to Cuming County.
When asked why he believes Greater Omaha stands out above other packers, Pete says it starts at the top with Henry Davis, owner of Greater Omaha. He is accessible to the staff. Pete says he can walk over to the desk of any staff member and address concerns. The corporate office isn't 300 miles from the plant and because it is a smaller plant, the cattle buyers can be very selective of the cattle they buy. Pete believes the well-trained plant employees of Greater Omaha and the facility itself produce top yields.
Pete's wife Christi is an artist and enjoys creating interior murals, especially in the elementary classrooms of their school. It brightens up their classrooms and brings smiles to all who enter. She also works at the public library.

her to work with the sheep. Each year she groomed and showed sheep from Pete's farm.

When asked to share a story from his years of buying cattle, he recalled one time in Canada where they use the sealed bid system. This story spanned the period of a month. The first week he bid on a set of pens and was high, getting the bid by a nickel. Week two, he was high by a dime. Week three, he was high again by a dime. This began to rattle the other cattle buyers, especially one that vowed to get the high bid so on week four he did indeed have the highest bid overbidding Pete by a dime. Pete knew the cattle were heavy and found they averaged 1,575 pounds, too heavy by his boss's standards so Pete was saved a good reaming from his boss.
Pete says discipline and strategy are essential when buying cattle. Pete is an expert in building repeat customers.

## Meet Dave, Specialist in Non-Hormone Treated Cattle

Caring for cattle has been an important part of life for David Grant. He grew up on a mixed cattle and grain farm in Olds, Canada, about an hour north of Calgary. He's been in the cattle business his whole life. At a junior college in Clarendon, TX, he judged meats and livestock. From there he went on to

Oklahoma State University and judged a combination of Aksarben livestock and meats, and did animal evaluation contests.
After college, he worked for 14 years with Cargill in their Texas plant where he did a training program with QSA in Canada and the United States. This program was the forefront to NHTC (nonhormone treated cattle). David is Greater Omaha's NHTC cattle buyer working with Europe, China, and Saudi Arabia. David joined GOP in April of last year. He said, "It is an amazing pipeline and sometimes people don't realize what it takes to get those products to foreign
countries as well as what it takes here in the United States."

David says, "Greater Omaha doesn’t depend on one customer or one country to buy our beef. We need to have diversification so that we have a complete portfolio to ship to customers that are able to help us utilize the entire carcass. In early October, we went to a 5-day food show in Germany. It was amazing to see what it takes to get the food to the table. There were over 160,000 people attending on just one day. The beef that we ship to foreign countries has to be premium quality beef as trucking, shipping, customs, and all of the paperwork involved to get it cleared for sale to distributors reduces its shelf life."
David's wife Jamie is a nurse practitioner working for Avera in Sioux Falls, SD. They have a $21 / 2$ year old son, Cooper, that keeps them busy.

When asked what makes GOP cattle better, he responded, "We're focused on cattle that grade well and are finished in the northern region. We have in-the-end customer satisfaction. Owner Henry Davis is a very forward-thinking businessman who tries to get in front of what he believes is coming in the industry and gets ahead of it. As a small packer, GOP can make those adjustments to satisfy our customer's needs."

David says, "The nice thing about working for Greater Omaha is that they get it done right the first time."

## Meet Matt,

 the Not-so New GuyMatt Bode is the newest addition to the Greater Omaha's cattle buying staff, bringing with him a rich experience in procurement and sales. Early in his career, his "customers" bought swinging beef. Nowadays his "customer" list is almost entirely producers. Matt is one of the few

Matt took a job working for IBP in Lexington, NE, and worked in merchandising and sorting carcasses into the different programs. From there, Matt went to work for Creekstone Farms and was instrumental in starting programs from scratch. The land of the Randy and Laura Fox ranch has six miles of the Moreau River running through it. There might be a cattail-edged stock dam over one hill and a sagebrush flat over the other. Gumbo gives way to sandy soil and it all combines to create a ranch that is varied in its makeup, yet "takes care of itself."
"That's what my Dad always said about this place. That the land would take care of itself and so far he's been right," Randy says.
That might be a humble answer to a question about ranch management. For Randy and Laura have spent their whole marriage being stewards of the Newell, SD ranch Randy was raised on. The couple has implemented crossfencing for better grazing distribution, installed upwards of 25 water tanks, miles of water line and taken part in

The steer calves are marketed through a local sale barn while all the heifers are retained and backgrounded. The black baldy heifers are often marketed through Mrnak's production sale and the straight Herefords become replacement heifers for the Foxes.
"We try
 to make our cattle look alike. Uniform. When we sell at a sale barn it's generally just two sorts with a small bunch of light steers," Randy says.

"The water is the biggest change I have seen to the ranch over the years," Laura says.

## The cattle

Hereford cattle have always run on the Fox Ranch since it was purchased in 1951. Randy says he appreciates the breed's docility, conformation, and thicker hide. His mother cows specifically do well with milk production.
"Hereford cattle get in your blood. I have always liked the Hereford. There are very few of us left around here that
liking Herefords, Randy says its because they are survivalists.
"Their hide is thicker and they can go through tougher winters. They kind of have to do it on their own here. We don't pamper a lot. Nothing goes hungry but they don't get fed full ration all the time either," Randy says.

## The family

Randy is one of four boys raised on the Fox Ranch. Two of his brothers ranch while a third works for a mineral block company. All live in western South Dakota.
He came straight back to ranch after

high school graduation and hasn't left. In 1987 his Dad passed on and he and brother, Kelly took over the operation. Then in the '90s, the brothers split and Randy became the sole operator. Today, Kelly's son Brian and his wife, Katie, and daughter are ranching with Randy and Laura.

nae and Larissa - who are now grown. Lynnae is married and teaching in Lemmon, SD where her husband, Bob works for Dean's AI service. Larissa is also married, has two children, Maci (6) and Noah (4), and works as an xray technician in Deadwood, SD. Her husband Josh is an elementary teacher.
"We try to plan everyone being home at the same time so we can all see each other," Laura says. "The grandkids love it out here."

Nephew, Brian has been at the ranch three years and has been a great asset to Randy with the day-to-day activities of the ranch. "He has taught me a lot," Randy acknowledges of what Brian has brought to the ranch. "I hope I am doing the same for him."

The younger Fox generation - Lynnae, Larissa and Brian - have added a little fun to the ranch too.
"I don't even plan branding anymore. They set the date. They even added themes to them, which has been fun," Randy laughs.

Laura's ranch role has changed over the years. She was more hands-on in their early years of marriage, and then as the girls grew older, and she took on a full-time town job, she moved to the role of helper and master cook. During spring branding you can find her in the kitchen creating enough food to feed the 30-40 people that help the Fox family.
The Foxes know they are blessed to live in a great part of the U.S. that also has great people for neighbors. People that help make big cattle working days go along easier and simple mundane things much more fun. "People might have good neighbors like ours, but no one has better," Randy confirms.

## Other Changes

Randy looks back on what has changed since his childhood in regards to the cattle. He says they use to winter their heifers on the open range, feed a little oats and not breed anything until it was two years old. "Now we keep them closer to home and grow them up bigger than what they use to be so they can calve at that earlier age," Randy says.

Laura says she has noticed the milk production of the mother cows has increased over the years. "There was a time when I wondered about some of the bred heifers not producing enough milk for their calves. Now that isn't a problem. That is the main thing I have seen get better in the herd."

## Key beliefs

Randy is a believer that conception is based a lot on the weather you are dealt. If there is rain and good grass, conception should be good. "It really depends a lot on what those cattle are eating," Randy says.

He also holds the Bible passage found in Psalms 50:10 close to heart. For every beast of the forest is mine, and the cattle upon a thousand hills, goes the passage that is part of a Psalm about the coming of the Lord and his true mightiness.
"My dad said to me that we never truly own anything. We are just caretakers of it. Laura and I are trying to be the best stewards we can be," Randy says.

## American Hereford Association Releases BOLT Genetic Evaluation

Dec. 7, 2017, KANSAS CITY The American Hereford Association (AHA) released the first updated expected progeny differences (EPDs) and corresponding accuracies using the Biometric Open Language Tools (BOLT) genetic evaluation software Dec. 4. The new genetic evaluation also includes two new traits, Sustained Cow Fertility (SCF) and Dry Matter Intake (DMI), and updated profit (\$) indexes.
"It's long been our goal to provide Hereford breeders the most advanced and reliable genetic evaluation possible," says AHA President Kevin Schultz. "This new genetic evaluation gives us one of the best tools to identify breed-leading genetics at a faster pace than ever before."
Due to the industry-leading Whole Herd Total Performance Records (TPR ${ }^{\mathrm{TM}}$ ) program, in its 17th year, and the current 53,000 Hereford genotypes on record, the AHA is poised for a stronghold in the DNA era, making Hereford cattle even more predictable.
Last year the Association pursued a genetic evaluation overhaul to allow for better use of genomics in its evaluation.
"BOLT provides a more robust evaluation by calculating true accuracy on animals," says AHA Chief Operating Officer and Director of Breed Improvement Shane Bedwell.

Utilizing BOLT, all factors associated with contemporary group makeup will be accounted for in the calculation of true accuracy. This genetic evaluation system moves away from a full multi-trait model, decoupling models to better estimate traits of interest. It also modifies contemporary group structure to allow for as much data as possible to affect the evaluation.
In addition, BOLT utilizes a cutoff strategy which only includes animals born after 2001 and animals related by three generations of pedigree.
"A genetic evaluation backed solely by Whole Herd TPR data strengthens the evaluation and takes out selection bias that occurred pre-Whole Herd TPR," Bedwell says.

Hereford breeder Jack Holden, Valier, MT, was a member of the advisory committee, comprised of cattlemen and the scientific community, who was tasked with reviewing the new genetic evaluation.
"The process of generating the new
genetic evaluation was really outstanding, and I feel comfortable with where we're at now," Holden says. "BOLT will give us better, more accurate indications of genetic potential in our animals. Any time we can identify that quicker, along with finding cattle that fit phenotypically, we can make faster genetic progress to improve our herd."

## New traits and updated \$Indexes

Released with the new genetic evaluation are two new traits: SCF and DMI. The AHA's new SCF EPD is a prediction of a cow's ability to continue to calve from three years of age through 12 years of age, given she calved as a two-year-old. The EPD is expressed as a deviation in the proportion of the ten-possible calvings to 12 years old expressed as a probability.
"The new SCF EPD is a powerful tool," Schultz says. "In a commercial cow herd, longevity and fertility are profit drivers. We're providing a new tool for that purpose."
Feed intake records from AHA research projects and breeder data collection have been analyzed in a genetic evaluation to predict DMI EPDs. Reported in pounds of feed consumed per
day, this EPD characterizes genetics for intake, with a lower numeric value being associated with less feed consumed on a dry matter basis.
SCF and DMI will now be included in the AHA \$Indexes, along with other economically relevant traits (ERTs), including carcass weight (CW) and mature cow weight (MCW).
DMI and CW will be included in all three AHA \$Indexes to help predict the cost associated with feed inputs and measure the end-product pounds that are critical for profit.
"SCF will replace scrotal circumference as the predictor of fertility and be a large contributor to both maternal indexes," Bedwell says. "Adding these ERTs into the profit indexes will provide a more robust and comprehensive selection tool for commercial producers to select Hereford bulls to be used on Angus based cows."
EPDs will be released once a week, an increase in frequency from the previous 10 times a year.
